F. INTRODUCTION, CONSIDERATION AND PASSING OF BY-LAWS AND MOTIONS

1. By-Law No. 22 – 07, A By-Law Relating to the Town of Saint Andrews Council Remuneration Second and Third Reading, FA221115

Council discussed By-Law No. 22-07, A By-Law Relating to the Town of Saint Andrews Council Remuneration, and the comments received from the Public Hearing of Objections. Mayor Henderson noted that he was willing to reduce the Mayor's salary by 20% to \$27,520.00 from \$34,400.00 and to provide the difference to the stipend for the fire department. Council noted that the Mayor's reduction was generous and dedicated to the community but it was noted that the Mayor works hard and has many obligations to the community. Council said that it is hard to justify a lower salary rate for the Mayor based on a similar community size and workload. Council supported keeping the Mayor's salary at \$34,400. This one-time raise for the new Council is helpful and the Fire Department stipend can be added at another time and reviewed by Council. It would be nice to reward them as well. It was noted that the formula used puts Councillors and the Mayor in the average salary range as the rest of the representative Councils across New Brunswick. Clerk Nopper provided clarification to comments from the Public Hearing of Objections. It was noted that the Local Governance Act Section 96 on Conflict of Interest indicated that Council was not in a conflict as Council has the right to set their remuneration. In addition, the province has set the remunerations for 56 entities in New Brunswick but left those in byelections to make their own decisions. The province provided matrixes to use to determine remuneration. Clarification was provided on the Consumer Price Index increases in the By-Law. Council either takes a smaller increase or has deferred taking an increase, as an example with this Council last year. Babysitting services were mentioned in the By-Law. This section was added to the By-Law by the last Council. There is a limit on funding and open to care for all ages. It is a support mechanism for Council to ensure they can attend and participate in Council events.

2. Town of Saint Andrews Capital Budget for 2023, FA221210

CAO Spear provided an overview of the proposed General Capital Budget and the Utility Capital Budget. It was noted that the Town has the ability to pass its Capital Budget as noted by the province under Local Governance Reform. Council was encouraged to pass the Capital Budgets as it would allow staff time to get tenders out in the early new year which has helped save the Town between 10% - 20% below the estimated costs of projects and has helped with the supply chain management delays.

For 2023 - \$4,827,000 in Capital Purchases, \$2,300,000 in Capital Grants, and \$875,000 in Borrowing which was previously authorized.

For 2024 - \$6,336,000 in Capital Purchases, \$2,250,000 in Capital Grants, and \$2,768,000 in Borrowing with a previous \$1,785,000 authorized.

General Capital Budget
